The Board of Public Works and Safety of Plymouth, Indiana, met in Regular Session at 6:00 p.m. on December 23, 2024. The meeting was held in the Council Chambers, on the second floor of the City Building, 124 N. Michigan St., Plymouth, Indiana.

Mayor Robert Listenberger called the meeting to order. Listenberger presided for Board Members Duane Culp, Don Ecker Jr., Shiloh Milner, and Dave Morrow, who were physically present. City Attorney Jeff Houin and Clerk-Treasurer Lynn Gorski were also present. The public was able to see and hear the meeting through Microsoft Teams.

Board members Morrow and Ecker moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the regular session of the Board of Public Works and Safety meeting of December 9, 2024, as presented. The motion carried.

Utility Superintendent Donnie Davidson presented the Second Amendment to the Lease Agreement with AT&T for use of the water tower at Parkview Street for cellular antennas. He stated the agreement was for up to 8 antennas and lease of the property below the water tower for their control center. He explained they needed to expand their system and AT&T had proposed paying an additional \$700.00 per month for the leasing of the tower and ground space. He stated he had reviewed the agreement with the City Attorney and they both agreed that everything is in order with the increase. He stated this would increase the monthly rent to approximately \$3,844 per month and it would also increases 4% annually. He added that if they must do any maintenance on the tower, they are required to remove all their items so that they can perform the work.

Ecker asked how long the agreement was good for.

Davidson responded until one party or the other cancels the agreement.

Board members Ecker and Milner moved and seconded to approve the second amendment to the agreement with AT&T for use of water tower for cellular antennas as presented. The motion carried.

City Engineer Dan Sellers informed the board that on December 26, 2024, they would start advertising for bids for the 2025 Street Projects, to be opened January 27, 2025.

Cemetery Assistant Superintendent Greg Carroll asked permission for a controlled burn at the Cemetery for their brush pile. He stated they would coordinate with Fire Chief Steve Holm and contact the Marshall County Sheriff to inform them what and when they would be doing this.

Ecker asked if this controlled burn was in the same general area that it had been in the past.

Caroll confirmed and stated that this burn would not happen for a couple of weeks.

Board members Ecker and Morrow moved and seconded to approve the request for the controlled burn at the Cemetery as presented. The motion carried.

City Attorney Houin presented three job description updates. The first two are Firefighter 1st Class and Firefighter Paramedic, which are simply to move the minimum age from 21 down to 18. He stated that they have the Career & Technical Education (CTE) course for firefighter training where they have high school students coming out of this course with firefighter certifications and they are ready to start the job as a firefighter, but they can't hire them because they are not old enough. He stated this would allow the City to potentially hire students that are coming out of this CTE class that have worked with their department.

He listed the third update was for the Human Resources Manager, where there are several changes to that job description that reflect duties that have been taken on by the HR Department that were not listed in the job description.

Board members Ecker and Culp moved and seconded to approve the Firefighter 1st Class, and the Firefighter Paramedic as presented. The motion carried.

Board members Ecker and Morrow moved and seconded to table the Human Resources Manager changes as presented. The motion carried.

Houin reported that they held the groundbreaking for the Water Street Townhomes last week. He stated they are requesting them to allow the closure of the parking lot at the corner of E. Garro and Water Streets during the construction. He added that construction barricades would be placed the day after Christmas.

Board members Culp and Ecker moved and seconded to close the parking lot as presented. The motion carried.

Board members Ecker and Morrow moved and seconded to allow the payroll for December 13, 2024, and the claims for December 23, 2024, as entered in Claim Register #2024-24. The motion carried.
